



The challenge is to be hospitable and welcoming. As a parish we pass the test with the cooling station, homeless sleeping on the sidewalk, soup kitchen, clothes closet, St. Vincent DePaul, and as we sit and visit with others in church.

The 3 visitors in first reading represent the Trinity. You always welcome the stranger. Abraham goes out of his way to provide a meal for them.

Martha and Mary are examples of active and contemplative spirituality. We need to live both....time to reflect and time to be active.

We come to Eucharist by listening to the Word, then we come together to receive the body and blood of Christ. We then go out to actively share Christ. Share the bounty of the blessings God has given us.

From Fr. Jay...

Two stories of hospitality today.

Abraham entertains God. Jesus is welcomed into the home of Martha and Mary. Hospitality was a part of the culture.

Whose expectations do we live by...Jesus....our culture...others in our life? Jesus expects us to choose the important stuff.

We need to take time to rest. God rested at the end of the creation story. Our time for rest is not time to watch TV. Time for rest is time to spend with God...to hear God.

We have to give time for our souls to catch up with our bodies. Time to listen, be silent, shut everything out and see what the Lord has to say.

What We Store in the Barn

I once knew a godly woman who had truly tasted the bitterness of this earthly life. This woman knew pain. She knew sacrifice. She knew hard labor and loss, including the death of a cherished child. She worked each day at a low-paying job, waiting patiently for her 65th birthday, when she could retire and devote herself full-time to her grandchildren. She crossed off the dwindling days on her calendar like a first grader waiting for Christmas.

Ninety-eight days before she was set to retire, she died suddenly. Her name was erased from the schedule at work and penciled over with that of her replacement hire.

All things are vanity.

I think we all know someone like this, don't we? If the details aren't exactly the same, the outline of the story is: someone labors "with wisdom and knowledge and skill," in the words of Ecclesiastes. And what profit comes to him? Sorrow and grief all his days. The proverbial barn filled with harvest and left to rot.

But I'll let you in on a secret: this isn't a sad story. I've only told you part of it.

This woman heard, daily, the voice of God, and against it she never hardened her heart, whatever news it brought her. This woman loved as hard as she worked. Every action was a form of evangelization. To talk to her was to feel the embrace of Christ.

As much as she waited for that retirement that never came, it was never the harvest in her barn.

This is what it means to be a true steward: to seek what is above.



Let Us Dream: The Path to A Better Future.

We have a great history of justice and charity work at All Saints, but the COVID pandemic has affected us all. Some are not yet comfortable returning to Mass, much less attending public meetings or activities.

I have been thinking about a book I read as we were all hunkering down during the pandemic. It's called:

Let Us Dream: The Path to A Better Future. This is a small book (6 x 8½ x 5¾) and 144 pages. Pope Francis wrote this book for American Catholics during the COVID crisis. He tells us we enter a crisis to be sifted, but we do not come out of a crisis the same as we were, but either better or worse. He suggests we need to think about what we experienced, what we saw and how our hearts were tested. The temptation is to retreat, and Pope Francis says instead we should make things better. "This is a moment to dream big, to rethink our priorities—what we value, what we want, what we seek—and to commit to act in our daily life on what we have dreamed of."



I think it would be immensely helpful to take time to consider his words and how they might apply to us. Things that were important to us before COVID, may not be now and something else may really be where we want to put our energies.

As the new Justice Minister at All Saints Parish, I would like us to start off the new Justice Ministry with both support and discovery. I envision the impact that can happen if many of us take 4 hours out of our busy life to think about COVID's impact and what it means to us, our community and what we should do as a result.

I will facilitate a small discussion group of Pope Francis' book **Let Us Dream** and include time for prayer for justice in the world, in our country, in our community, in our Parish, in our Justice Ministry and in ourselves. We would meet four times before Mass to discuss Pope Francis' book **Let Us Dream**.

The book is divided into four sessions:

- Prologue - first session
- A Time To See - second session
- A Time To Choose - third session
- A Time To Act and Epilogue – fourth session



A NEW opportunity Let Us Dream book discussions on Zoom

I'm planning to do Zoom book discussion sessions in August.
It would be the same series of 4 sessions as listed above.

The book costs about \$16 new.

Prayer: The 3rd Leg of Justice

We often talk about the Two Feet of Love: Charity and Justice. I love the symbolism of the two feet. I tend to think of Justice work as a stool with 3 legs: Charity, Justice, and Prayer. The First leg– Charity is responsible for addressing the needs of the poor and disadvantaged. The Second leg– Justice is responsible for creating change in society so that situations that create a need for charity are addressed. But a stool with two legs can't be used. We need that Third leg– Prayer. Prayer gives us the hope and courage to carry out Charity and Justice.

One of the things I lost during COVID was the feeling of being connected to others of like values. I began to think there were fewer people "out there" who believed in taking care of their neighbor because all I could see on the TV and news was "me" or "individual needs". It seemed like everyone was just focused on themselves and what was best for them.

One of the benefits I have found in doing the Let US Dream discussion and prayer series is meeting and hearing others talk about looking out for the needs of others and the environment. They may say it differently than me or focus on a different part that makes me think deeper and see things more clearly, but the big picture about justice is the same. These discussions have given me hope-there are others who care and can talk about justice in ways that make me think I **should/could/can** do something.

You may have noticed we have started two prayers during Mass recently– The Prayer for Justice and the Prayer for Ukraine. There is power in prayers said when we gather as a community of believers at Mass and there is also power in solo prayers.

The Prayer for Justice is being said after Petitions. In one voice we are praying for Justice to underscore how important Justice is to those who attend All Saints. It is part of our vision statement: We are called to be a faith filled family, who acts justly, lives tenderly, forgives freely and walks humbly with our God. Many of us come to All Saints and others stay due to Fr. Jay's and Fr. Steve's homilies, encouragement to act justly, and become involved in justice and charity activities in our community and the larger world.

We are praying in unison the Prayer for Ukraine at the end of Communion to lift up those caught in the cross hairs of war in Ukraine and to pray for the end of violence and just peace for Ukraine.

Pope Francis reminds us that the Lord gave us a charge to act justly, to take care of others and the environment. He suggests we need to seek fraternity or connections with others of faith so we can act in solidarity with those on the edges and find new ways to solve larger problems that affect us all.

He believes faith is best lived out with others and that connection can happen in many ways. One way is at Mass "when we are connected, forming one body, one spirit in Christ" as we participate together, hear the prayers, and add our own thoughts and prayers. Also, when our prayers are uttered alone, in our homes, at our tables and in our beds, they link us to God and to each other. Many think I'm too old, too tired, too frail, too ill or don't have the time due too many responsibilities to do acts of justice anymore. But each of us has the capacity to pray and prayer can also be an act of justice.

Think of the power of All Saints to affect justice when we have hundreds of congregational prayers and individual prayers going out into the world every month, week, every day for a just community that looks after the world the Lord gave us.

Several weeks ago, those at Mass had the opportunity to take home a prayer card of The Prayer for Ukraine if you didn't get one there are more available. We are also distributing the Prayer for Justice. There are two sizes: regular and a larger size for those with visual difficulties.
