## Prayer is an important part of a pilgrimage.

"St. Alphonsus Liguori Catholic Church is known as the 'Rock'. The parish is staffed by the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer, better known as the Redemptorists. We are an 'authentically Black and truly Catholic' Parish."



We will visit St. Alphonsus Liguori Catholic Church with a full morning of activities. The church is a beautiful Gothic revival style with 54 stained glass windows installed for the 1904 World's Fair by Mayer and Co. of Munich, Germany. Since we are a group of various faiths, we will tour the church before Mass to learn about the symbolism in the church and what to expect in the service. After Mass we will meet with the St. Alphonsus Peace and Justice members to exchange information about justice activities in our churches and communities.

# What is a faith and justice pilgrimage?

A pilgrimage is more than a trip to an important site, but a spiritual journey that deepens one's understanding. A pilgrimage lets us immerse ourselves in the culture and the historical and spiritual aspects of where we visit. Be in a prayerful and reflective mind to witness and feel what God has to say to you about what you see and experience.

We will visit places at the center of the struggles for racial and civil liberty that call us to examine our own social justice actions.

Virginia Minor, a suffragette, was denied voting rights in the 1870's. Slaves and women were not allowed in the courthouse and were not present, when their suit was heard.
