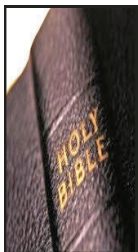

How is the Lectionary arranged?

As we look forward to the new Church year which begins on the 1st Sunday of Advent, December 3rd, we begin a new cycle of readings that we will hear at weekend Masses and weekday Masses.



The Lectionary is arranged in two cycles, one for Sundays and one for weekdays.

The Sunday cycle is divided into three years, labeled A, B, and C. 2023 is Year A. 2024 is Year B, 2025 is Year C, etc.

In Year A, we read mostly from the Gospel of Matthew.

In Year B, we read the Gospel of Mark and chapter 6 of the Gospel of John.

In Year C, we read the Gospel of Luke. The Gospel of John is read during Lent and the Easter season in all three years.

The first reading, usually from the Old Testament, reflects important themes from the Gospel reading. The second reading is usually from one of the epistles, a letter written to an early church community. These letters are read semi-continuously. Each Sunday, we pick up close to where we left off the Sunday before, though some passages are never read.

Last day to donate a gift card is Friday, December 8th.

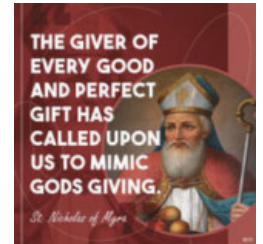

This month, we have been studying Stewardship. In December, we will be learning about Generosity. We are looking at an "Advent Giving Wreath." As we look forward to the beginning of the Church year and the Season of Advent, how can our Advent wreath remind us to give during this season? Justice Challenge Solemnity of Christ the King

The Gospel for Sunday proclaims the famous story Jesus told of the sheep and goats. The way we treat the least of our brothers and sisters is so important to our faith that it actually determines our eternal destiny. Your challenge this week is to go on a mini-retreat (10 minutes is fine). Read Matthew 25:31-46 slowly and prayerfully. Then close your eyes and ask God to help you identify the least of *your* brothers and sisters. Who are the people whom Jesus wants you to feed, clothe, visit, or minister to in some special way? Now hold these people in your heart as you ask God to help you discern which person or group you are called to help right now. What do they need that you can provide? Live out the Gospel call to feed or shelter or clothe or visit them.

Ministry Update... A new ministry... Hand Up



As you know, our Wednesday mornings offer a Community Meal for lunch and a Clothes Closet. These two ministries are charity ministries. Lunch and clothing items are given to people in need.

We are in the process of trying to formalize a Wednesday morning ministry. We are calling it "Hand Up." We are looking for this to be an opportunity to help people take small steps needed to help them move forward from whatever situation they find themselves in. Perhaps we can help them... make phone calls in search for housing or shelter; get an ID so they can apply for assistance; make a copy of paperwork they need to submit for services they need; call for financial help with overdue bills; find specific community resources they need.

This ministry will need volunteers who are interested in working with our neighbors (those who are homeless or living in poverty who come on Wednesday mornings), hearing their story, and building a relationship with them. This will enable the volunteer to have an idea what kind of services the neighbor already has available, and what resources we may be able to help them find.

Do you like to talk with people? People you don't know? Do you have a sense of organization to gather resource information? Find information in a resource book? Do you want to work for justice in small steps? Pray with this ministry possibility. Issue committees are charged with formulating the problem into something that is possible to change and identifying who is in the community that can make these changes. Their work leads up to the questions that are put to community leaders at the Neimiah Action.

From the homilies recently...

Fr. Steve

All of these readings today really sound like funeral readings... Stay awake, be ready, get your house in order. That's what the Scriptures are teaching us.

The challenge today is to wait and watch be patient. Story of the wise and foolish virgins is our story because a lot of times we're not ready either. The story says that God's time is not our time. We need to have our oil with us. The culture in Palestine is much different than ours. It was the father who signed the contract. The father and the bride groom will decide what was to be given. So the bride never knew when the wedding would be.

If we want to get to heaven, access can't be earned or given by another. We have to earn our own way into the kingdom. The story tells us we don't know the day or the hour.

We can't wait for the last minute. Are we making the most of all the opportunities God has given us? Are we faithful each day to our family, to our neighbors? Is there anything we really need to take care of now that we've been putting off for a long time? Is there any unfinished business in our own life? Do people know how much you really appreciate and love them? When the bride groom comes, will you be called a friend or a stranger?

CHRIST THE KING

This parable has fallen on hard times. We can be very critical. Why didn't the bridesmaids share their oil with those who didn't have any? And why did the bridegroom shut the door not let them in? It doesn't sound like Jesus' message. So what's going on here?

I think it is necessary to go back into the culture and times when Jesus lived because it's different than we have.

I think people live by clock time or Palestinian time. I called clock time, Jasper time, because these people live by the clock. If they're not 10 minutes early, they're late. Jesus lived on Palestinian time. That was totally different.

The bridesmaids all knew that it could be a long time. Perhaps a long, long time. The bridesmaids with their lamps would lead the bride to the home of the groom, where the wedding would occur.

Now, when we think of the bridegroom coming, we think of Jesus coming. We think of the end of the world. I think of Jesus coming to us each day. We need to be ready. How does he come? He comes in intuitions. He makes himself known. I try to tune into the past to see how God was working.

We need to be ready and open to hear what God has to say. I need to hear what he says when he says it. We have to realize how God has been working in our lives, and be grateful.

Let's take a few moments of silence to tell God that we are open to hear what he has to tell us and thank him for the ways he has spoken to us in the past and how he has helped us.

For more than 50 years, the Catholic Campaign for Human Development (CCHD) has supported organizations that combat poverty and improve the lives of people in communities across the United States. Not only do CCHD-funded organizations advocate with civic, business, and community religious leaders to improve access to affordable housing, job and educational opportunities, and rights for immigrants—they also respond quickly to urgent needs when communities experience emergencies.

An effective response to natural disasters begins with effective planning before disasters occur. In New Orleans and surrounding areas in southern Louisiana, CCHD is helping Together New Orleans develop a project called Community Lighthouse, which will equip 85 congregations and community organizations with commercial-scale solar power and backup battery storage. This effort will form a network of response centers ready to serve

communities in a hurricane or other natural disaster once the solar power equipment is completely installed. By using solar power and backup batteries, the response centers can continue operating in the event of power loss—but they will also be using clean, renewable energy rather than fossil fuels that contribute to climate change and pollution.

When you support CCHD, you help local communities across the country innovate and work together to solve their own unique challenges. Twenty-five percent of your contribution stays in your diocese to support the organizations addressing your community's needs for housing, jobs, and educational opportunities—and for keeping the lights on during a storm.

Por más de 50 años, la Campaña Católica para el Desarrollo Humano (CCHD) ha apoyado a organizaciones que luchan contra la pobreza y mejoran la vida de personas en comunidades en Estados Unidos. Las organizaciones financiadas por CCHD no solo abogan ante los líderes civiles, comerciales y líderes religiosos de la comunidad a fin de mejorar el acceso a viviendas asequibles, oportunidades laborales y educativas y los derechos de los inmigrantes—también responden rápidamente a las necesidades urgentes de las comunidades cuando éstas sufren emergencias.

Una respuesta efectiva a los desastres naturales empieza con una planificación eficaz antes que ocurra el desastre. En Nueva Orleans, y en las áreas adyacentes en el sur de Luisiana, CCHD está ayudando a *Together New Orleans* para desarrollar un proyecto llamado *Community Lighthouse*, el cual equipará de energía solar a escala comercial y el almacenamiento de baterías auxiliares a 85 congregaciones y organizaciones comunitarias. Este esfuerzo establecerá una red de centros de respuesta lista para servir

a las comunidades en caso de huracán, o de cualquier otro desastre natural, una vez que el equipo de energía solar esté completamente instalado. Al utilizar la energía solar y las baterías auxiliares, los centros de respuesta continuarán operando en el caso de perder energía—pero también utilizarán energía limpia y renovable, en lugar de combustibles fósiles que contribuyen al cambio climático y a la contaminación.

Cuando ustedes apoyan a CCHD, están ayudando a comunidades locales en todo el país a innovar y trabajar juntas para resolver sus propios y singulares desafíos. El veinticinco por ciento de sus contribuciones permanece en su diócesis para apoyar a las organizaciones que se encargan de responder a las necesidades de su comunidad para la vivienda, los trabajos y las oportunidades educativas—y para mantener las luces encendidas durante una tormenta.

Congregations Acting for Justice & Empowerment

Forty All Saints CAJE Network members attended the CAJE Community Problems assembly Monday night, November 13th at Holy Redeemer. This gathering of 213 was the largest in a number of years for the 27 congregations who make up CAJE. Local leaders reported on the impact CAJE's issue campaigns. Southwestern Behavioral Health Care has started seeing families and dually diagnosed children and reported on the application and screening process. The new Diversion Center has been open part time for almost two weeks and has seen 7 people who would have landed in jail or the hospital. Mayor Winnecke reported on affordable housing projects and indicated that 12.5 million is going into projects that will build or rehab affordable housing units. The Gun Violence Initiative has reported amazing statistics for this year including fewer shots fired and significantly fewer deaths. It was clear that the successes of these projects happened because CAJE asked the hard questions and the community especially Mayor Winnecke committed to solutions. Network members voted on whether to make affordable housing, mental health and addiction or educational supports (tutoring and resources that help children succeed in school). Educational Supports was selected as the major campaign for this year.



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
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
